Gregg Lambert (Syracuse University, US)

After completing his PhD, under the direction of late French philosopher Jacques Derrida, Professor Lambert joined the Department of English at Syracuse University in 1996, and was later appointed to Full Professor and Chair of English in 2005. In 2008, he was appointed as the Founding Director of the Humanities Center, where he currently holds a distinguished research appointment as Dean's Professor of Humanities in the College of Arts and Sciences. Since 2008, Professor Lambert has also served as Principal Investigator and Director of the Central New York Humanities Corridor, a regional collaborative research network between Syracuse University, Cornell University, the University of Rochester, and the NY6 Liberal Arts Consortium which has been generously supported by three consecutive awards from the Andrew W. Mellon Foundation. Author of fifteen books, critical editions, and more than a hundred articles in journals and critical editions, Professor Lambert is internationally renowned for his scholarly writings on critical theory, philosophy, the role of the Humanities in the contemporary university, and; especially for his work on the French philosophers Gilles Deleuze and Jacques Derrida.

Michal Herer (University of Warsaw, Poland)

Michał Herer is an assistant professor at the Faculty of Philosophy at the University of Warsaw. He has been on research scholarships in Germany (Erasmus, Deutscher Akademischer Austauschdienst) and France (Centre National du Livre Since, French Government scholarships) and held lectures at the École des Hautes Études en Sciences Sociales in Paris. His doctoral dissertation (*Gilles Deleuze. Structures – Machines – Creations*, Kraków, 2006), received an award from the Polish Ministry of Science and Higher Education, and his essay on Friendship (*Pochwała przyjaźni*, Warsaw 2017 / *In Praise of Friendship* 2021) won the prestigious Barbara Skarga Foundation Prize. In *The Philosophy of the Actual* (Warsaw, 2012) he developed the Foucauldian understanding of philosophy as ontology of actuality. In his research he focuses on social, economic and political transformations of global capitalism, and their impact on the processes of subjectivation. Michał Herer has also been working as translator of philosophical and sociological books from French (Deleuze, Foucault, Althusser) and German (Blumenberg, Theweleit) into Polish.
